

THE LESSON FOR THE DAY No. 2

(Reprinted, with due acknowledgements, from a recent article in THE DIRECTOR, Journal of The Institute of Directors)

This Christmas, something like £65m. worth of books may change hands at the busiest time of the year for the publishing industry, which appears on paper to be going from strength to strength. In 1975, a record 35,608 volumes were produced by British publishers, resulting in a turnover of £351m., and figures for the first quarter of 1976 show a healthy increase over the comparable period last year. All this despite savage inflationary pressures which have, in a very short time, pushed the bookbuyer into the era of the £5 novel and the £10 biography. The years of cheap books in Britain are over as decisively as the years of cheap food.

No comment necessary !

But appearances are not all they seem. Publishing may still be 'an occupation for gentlemen', but it has had perforce to become a good deal less gentlemanly in practice after the most searing couple of years in living memory: many an author is now smarting over a broken contract as books commissioned in the palmy days have been cancelled, often in mid-production. Printing and binding costs went up by 70 per cent in. 1972-75; paper costs have rocketed by around 300 per cent in three years. For many small publishers, desperately undercapitalised and operating as a cottage indus--the wonder is that they are still in business at all.

SHORT MEASURE

Unfortunately, lack of space and time -- with the Easter double mail-out almost upon us -- prevents publication of a selection of Friars' letters as is our usual wont. Perhaps we can include some of them in our next Gazette.

But we could not 'go to Press' without thanking all those readers who have written us such wonderful heart-warming letters, and the many who sent us Christmas cards last season. All your cards found their honoured display position in the Editorial sanctum and afforded us a great deal of pleasure.

We do sincerely regret the essential brevity of this SPRING EDITION of the Gazette. But we do, as said, have to mail you out our Easter offerings: THE BOUNDER'S REBELLION and BUNTER THE HYPNOTIST in good time for the coming holidays, and that must take priority. Agreed nem con?


