

Greetings Friars!

Publication of the November and December titles marks the safe conclusion of another season's programme. And relief is profound, because we have been subjected to very serious delays both at the printing and the bookbinding ends of the operation.

Everything at the latter part of our programme has been running outrageously late, and all appeals have fallen on stony ground. However, all's well that ends well, and Magnet Volume 67 and Greyfriars Library No. 1 are now safely in your eager hands. We have been promised better service in 1979, and can only hope that these assurances are kept.

PRICES

As from the New Year, there will be a small increase of 45 pence in the price of each Greyfriars Press volume. Of course, it is by no means enough to compensate us for the price increases the Company has had to bear through escalating production costs over the past two years throughout all of which time we have not passed on our losses. So we shall have to look to other small economies to create sound viability.

For the time being there will be no increase in the prices of Book Club volumes.



'SINGLES' CATALOGUE

For some time past, we have been producing a 'spin-off' run of approximately 40 copies in single (24, 32 or 44 page) form of each Greyfriars Press book published. These are now being made available at 60 pence each, post free. We hope to produce a comprehensive catalogue of 'single copy' titles shortly.

"As ITV demonstrated a decade ago, even when taking Blake a long way back in his history there was no need to give him a Monty Python treatment burlesquing "ripping yarns of spiffing adventure" to quote a phrase applied by the Press to this misconceived and disastrous BBC version of Sexton Blake.

And since the serial appears to have been derived from Christmas pantomime, it is hardly surprising that the acting had all the hamminess of such a show — culminating in that appalling coyly-modest smile, with downcast eyes, given by 'Blake' on being assured that he was, indeed, the 'chosen one'. I have seen all the Sexton Blake cinema films, heard all the Sexton Blake radio plays, and seen all the Sexton Blake television serials. If asked to name the very worst of them all, I would have no hesitation in making 'Sexton Blake and the Demon God' the chosen one!
