PROFIT - AND LOSS

As Club members will be well aware, we have not raised the prices of Book Club volumes for nearly *four years*. Knowing of the constantly rising production costs we have to endure here (paper, printing and binding, etc.) you don't need to be a mathematician to realise that our profit loss situation has been worsening year by year — indeed almost month by month!

We have borne it stoically all these years, to your benefit, but the time has come when we must be realistic, else the Greyfriars Book Club will disappear off the publishing scene.



Accordingly, our Club price per volume must increase to £15 per volume from August. Twenty-five percent over the span of nearly four years when, all around, our own costs have risen by more than twenty percent *every twelve months*. Surely no-one can dispute that we have done all of our share — and more — to hold price increases at bay!

In any case, as OUT-OF-PRINT copies already fetching from £25 to £50 — in one case even £100 — you will no doubt agree that at the new price our titles are still an excellent investment. We were about to say 'Gilt Edged', but they are that already, oi! (Monty Lowther, please copy!)



MAGNET COMPANION '77 SUPPLEMENT

Our Supplement has now been published and details are given in the Autumn Catalogue. As promised, we have kept the price to purely a nominal one, in a vain effort to cover our printing costs. It is an invaluable addition to the main Companion and brings all information bang up to date — to Summer 1980. Also it corrects some setting errors that crept into the original work. No Collector can afford to be without it.

REITERATION

Because the following message seems to have failed to register with some of our non-bond Friars, we consider it worthwhile to repeat it here.

For your peace of mind, and for the furtherance of our 'impeccably efficient and imperturbable service' (to quote Friar Morley of Worthing) please read, mark, learn and inwardly digest:

ORDERING FORWARD AND BACK



Apart from our Bond customers, who know exactly where they stand regarding delivery dates, there are those who order back stock titles for immediate delivery — but sometimes confound this simple operation by including a FORWARD title on their order list.

This means that, if they have only paid postage for one parcel of books, the whole of their order is held up until the FORWARD TITLE is available.

And some customers, uncomprehendingly, then write in to demand to know why their order has not been serviced by same-day return post, as is our normal custom with back-stock titles.

Hope all is now clearly understood.

Whilst on this subject, another point worth noting: the month of publication given in our seasonal catalogues usually means the *end* of the particular month in question rather than the beginning. Thus, a book announced for August publication — for example — is not likely to be available until the *end* of August: certainly not on August the First! Well worth remembering.

Here endeth the lesson.


