'To be frank, I am very surprised that so many of these issues are still available. From our earlier correspondence, knowing how few of some of these titles were, I can see a fast-growing collectors' market in some of these items in a couple of years time and am laying down my own stocks accordingly.

'If the evidence of your own Sales and Wants column is anything to go by, the price of these issues is likely to increase fourfold over the next year or two. And that's a way of beating inflation if ever I saw one! These are small, limited editions. And cheap! Thank you very much.'



Another scarce item is the subject of Mr. J. Packer's letter from 48 Alinora Crescent, Goringby-Sea, Sussex, who writes: 'Immediately on receiving the Greyfriars Gazette Newsletter No.37, I wrote to Mr. John Hyde, one of the advertisers, for Vol. 22 (Billy Bunter's Christmas) which he was offering for sale at £30.

'Mr Hyde replied, advising me that the book has already been sold, adding that my application was only one of dozens he received from collectors anxious to buy it.

'No doubt you already appreciate that there is a great demand for this book. Is there any chance at all that you may reprint it? You may consider that reprinting a limited number would be worthwhile, with so many collectors wishing to purchase, and willing to pay as much as £30 for this extremely scarce item.'

A point worth mentioning has been raised by Dr. P.D. McCall, of 43 Broad Street, Wokingham, Berkshire, who writes: 'A reminder re. the list of 'Magnets Reprinted' in *Collectors Pie. No. 2*. It is mine and not Friar Lovedays. 'In his own words, it's more useful than his!'



And a request from Miss A. Clarke, of 105 Geraldine Road, Wandsworth, London SW18 2NJ, who says: 'I'm very glad to see so many good stories, especially the *Greyfriars Actors* and *Plotters of St. Jim's*— all my favourite characters I Also more sub stories— they make an interesting change and often give a new slant on the characters as well as bringing in different backgrounds, as in *The Schoolboy Broadcasters* and *Heroes of the Air*.

'I agree with Miss Witty in Australia re, the Union Jack, but I read a Nelson Lee recently that was spookier than anything in the Union Jack — Nerki the Sorcerer — 2nd NS Nos 152 - 154 — a Haunted House at Christmas, as good as The Haunted School.

'Might some of these be included sometime?'

Hopton, of 'Karunda', 79 Scalpcliffe Road, Burton-on-Trent, Staffordshire, has a request, too: 'I am writing on behalf of many of my friends to ask you to reprint Magnet Volumes 21, 22 and 23, and also the *Greyfriars Holiday Annual of 1974*, as there are so many of your Greyfriars fans who have not got these books and would be absolutely delighted if you would print more. Alternatively, would you reprint them as Magnet 'singles'? I can assure you that the response would be absolutely terrific.'

Early Club Magnets have elicited some correspondence of late. Mr C. Oliver, of 34 Belfield Avenue, May Bank, Newcastle, Staffs, says: 'Re. the early Red Magnets in the new Club series — I find that as one becomes involved in these early Magnet stories and accustomed to that period of time, they are very enjoyable indeed to read, though of course very different from the Magnet of the 1930's'.



And from Flat 7, Coryton House, 128 New Cavendish Street, London W1, Mrs Novara James writes: 'I've just finished reading *The Famous Four* and *Greyfriars Versus St. Jim's*, club volumes and enjoyed both tremendously. There is a certain period charm about these very early Magnets which makes me prefer them to those written afterwards. And Bunter's character is not half so obnoxious as it later becomes.'

Friar John Lewis, Inspector-General of Castells and Forts in Wales and Ye Marches, has put quill to paper to record a suggestion: 'When the present stock of Greyfriars 'Old Boys' Club Ties comes to an end, would it be possible for you to consider ordering a new version? I find that, as a banker, my Greyfriars Tie frequently falls under the critical eye of the general public, and I am becoming rather tired of being asked 'How many pints' did I have to lower before I qualified for my Club Tie. The customers in their gross ignorance assuming the friars' cowl motif to be a BEER DISPENSER!

'May I suggest a design based perhaps on the shield depicted on the Greyfriars Press heraldic arms, which embodies the HB motif. For, in all truth, without you, Sir, none of us would be able to wear an Old Friars tie at all!'

The Pagans wanted to play games on Sunday if they so wished. Wharton & Co were horrified.

'Even reading *The Sunday Crusaders* today, it is an excellent story, very sincere and, to me, quite moving.'

From Riyadh, PO Box 4735, Saudi Arabia, Friar David Urch writes: 'May I say a word in defence of Mr Cyril Parratt who thought that Bunter the Bad Lad (Greyfriars Library No 2) was a substitute story? I was also puzzled by this offering, but I think that the trouble is that three disparate stories have been tacked onto one another. For example, the 'Bandit' part was again available to us in its proper form in the ultimate issue in Magnet Vol. 73, Under Bunter's Thumb, and though I have not yet read it I am confident that the first part of SOL 237 has been reproduced, in the original, as Magnet issue 996, Bunter's Brainstorm, in the Collectors' Pie volume. Certainly there is nothing to beat the originals, but may I also say in passing that although the 'Bandit' may indeed be the genuine McCoy, it is not a particularly inspired effort by the Master. It is as well to remember, perhaps, that Homer is not the only one to nod.

'As to the vexed question of the subs, surely the dream of most of us is to have Nos 1 to 1683 complete in facsimile? I realise that only those who actually possess all the Club volumes can succeed, and it is possible that there are still some copies of the elusive Volume 3 which don't form a part of a putative complete collection; and for many people it must remain a dream. (Thanks be to God, I have Club Vol. 3, and also the 'difficult' GHA 1974 and G.P. Vols. Nos 21 to 24).'

## McCALL'S GREYFRIARS GUIDE



'I don't know if you intend to issue an addenda to this Guide on the lines of the Supplement to the Magnet Companion,' Mr R.J. Lewis writes, from Hill Top, Liverpool Road, Neston, South Wirral. 'But if you do, may I respectfully suggest a few inclusions which are strangely absent from Dr McCall's opus. For example, to name but a few:

COURTFIELD ARMS: A public house frequented by Mr Dance whilst Whiffles' Circus was at Courtfield. (1070)

MAULEVERER, Brian: Cousin of Mauly.

PEAL OF BELLS, The: An inn at Greenoaks, Wilts, where Bunter and Mr Whiffles slept under the same roof. Has a home-brewed draught beer.

REDFERN, Barbara: Fourth Form Captain at Cliff House.

MERRY, Tom: Form Captain, St Jim's.

MAULEVERER TOWERS is another entry in the Directory which is conspicuous by its absence SNARKER, Mr: Mr Bunter's office manager, (1076) SAMSON: Strong man in Whiffle's Circus. 'But when you next see Dr McCall do please salute him for me. Any fool can spot a fee omissions, but it takes a real scholar to compile such an epic as The Greyfriars Guide!" To which Dr Peter McCall has replied: 'Mea Culpa! Henry S Quelch has given me a 'book' for the omission of Tom Merry. His absence at Calling Over was not noticed until too late! 'On the lesser characters - most are mentioned en passant with other people or place i.e. Michael the Gipsy in The Hikers Series is mentioned with Joseph, his friend. 'Brian Mauleverer is entered as Ysabel Dick, (In fact several of the Mauleverers seem to have been purged from my original computer file to my final printout, which is as you see it). 'I still have nearly 1,000 reference cards on file which had to be omitted to try and keep the book down to its working length (240 pages II) The original plan was to have some two-thirds of the present material on each page. In its present form, there are in excess of 2,200 entries; some had to be lopped. 'But never fear. Rest assured. Plans are already in hand for the Complete Greyfriars Guide: either in the form of Volume II - containing the omissions from Volume I and the cast list from the as yet unpublished Magnets or (and this is my hope!) A TWO VOLUME GUIDE - Volume I, A-M; Volume II, N-Z plus Appendices. However, time will tell!
