

"No VAT on books during the lifetime of this Parliament".

At least we have been granted a breathing space! A temporary reprieve.

Our thanks to all you good people who answered our plea (Gaz No. 42) to write/lobby your Member of Parliament on this matter.

PRICES

Production costs, printing, binding, paper - especially paper - continue to rise inexorably. Thus, our profit/ loss margin continues to diminish - inexorably! The sensible, logical, consequence and one employed by all sound business's, is to pass on, and share the load, with their consumers . . . that means you, Friars!

However, let our Readers rest easy. It is not our intention to abide by those hard rules in this moment of crisis. It is our intention to grit our teeth, summon up the blood, cry nil illigitemus corborundum, (or something like that!) and maintain price stability at least into 1986.

In short: no immediate price increases.

It may be that this policy of rigidity on our longstanding price structure which has held firm since December 1983 may not be able to stand the strain against constantly escalating production costs.

Thus, our long cherished ambition — to publish every issue of the Magnet, 1908 to 1940 – will not be achieved. That would be a sad day for Friardom – but a possibility which must be faced. However, no effort will be spared here at Greyfriars Press to keep the flags of S S Augustine and Francis flying. And long may it continue so.

NEW O/P TITLES

We have to report that Magnet Vol. 34, BUNTERS SEA-SIDE CAPER is now completely O/P. No stocks at warehouse, no stocks at 27A.

The GHA 1920 is almost O/P. Only a few copies remain at 27A.

And stocks of ALONZO THE GREAT (Vol. 20) are running very low.




BOND-TIME
