

The company hopes to continue the Greyfriars Book Club series for some time to come. But regretfully, it no longer makes economic sense to continue with the standard Greyfriars Press volumes.

With every Greyfriars Press book published over the past few years, our accountants/auditors tell us we have shown losses. And that, as the phrase has it, is no way to run a battleship.

Consequently, this particular craft is foundering, and it is time that we 'abandoned ship'.

This we are about to do.

Our general book programme (non-Greyfriars) will, naturally, continue, and our Greyfriars Book Club series will also continue, so long as it is viable. The moment that our accountants tell us that it is not, we shall have to take to the boats again. So rally round, jolly tars of the good ship s.s Greyfriars, and give us all the support you can.

The harsh fact is that the Greyfriars programme has only been sustained by our other publishing endeavours and that for too long!

The Greyfriars Book Club volumes, selling at £18, will continue as before, so long as they are not loss-making.

So please 'buck up', you recumbent Book Club members who signed your intent Forms — some of you several years ago. Resume your active membership and help at least to keep Greyfriars Book Club alive.

Because it is all that is left now of that glorious project to which we all set our hands in those high-flying days of 1971 — fifteen long year ago — when we determined, with your support, to publish every Magnet from 1908 to 1940. We have almost achieved that goal, short of a few hundred! But without your unstinting and unwavering support, we cannot reach that final target. True, our numbers are diminishing, but surely there are enough of us left to achieve the Great Aim?

If our appeal falls upon deaf ears, then so be it. We here can do no more than give due warning of the direful consequences.




THE NEW BOND



Friar Milligan's letter, published in Gazette No. 44, evoked a mixed response. Friar Tim Salisbury, of 20 Uphill Road South, Uphill, Weston-Super-Mare, Somerset, wrote: 'I hope you decide to reissue Club Volume No. 1 The Worst Boy at Greyfriars, as I did not manage to buy a copy of it before it went out of print, and I know quite a few others who missed it, too,'



'I feel to do as Friar Milligan wishes would bring into question the purpose of the whole operation. If he wishes to purchase the aforementioned volume, he could do what I have done on many occasions and contact people who are selling the book he requires or, indeed, he could himself advertise in the Gazette."



Friar Milligan, 4 Enid Drive, Upper Nowtownards Road, Belfast BT5 6EN, says: 'I wrote my letter in mid-November, after reading a request from Friar Evans, in the then current issue of the Gazette, that you consider republishing Club Volume 1 in a special soft-cover edition. I wanted to give his request my support. I noticed that my letter was printed in the last edition of the Gazette, but that unlike many other letters which

appeared in that issue, it received no editorial comment. Is this good or bad? Once again, I urge you to consider reprinting this 'special', as I am sure that the response would be very favourable and such a reprint would be greeted with pleasure by all those Friars who had the misfortune to miss the first edition.'



Recently, many Friars have been writing to us to express their disquiet on the quantity of output. Friar John Kennedy of 14 Lordship Lane, London SE22 8HN is one of them: 'Thank you for replying to my recent letter in Gazette No. 44. I am naturally disappointed that economics do not permit you to publish Greyfriars Book Club volumes at the rate of one a month. Also, my concern is that your publishing programme is slowing down. At your peak, you published 16 volumes a year — Club books and 'ordinary' titles. But for the first half of 1986 there will only be six. Perhaps only twelve for the entire year!

'And now you make the disquieting announcement that Magnets 204–231 and 256–281 have gone missing. I make that 58 issues — or 9 Club books which we may never see. Way back in 1972, I set up a grid of numbers running from 1 to 1683. My deletions from this grid are now decelerating, and I am beginning to wonder if the last deletion will ever be made.

'With regard to the missing issues, would it not be possible to publish Book Club volumes containing whatever odd Magnet numbers you can lay your hands on? Surely, this is better than publishing none. I for one would be grateful for such an approach, even if it did mean jumping from volume to volume in reading a series, when you did at last track down the 'rogue' issues.

'This said, I must express my gratitude that you embarked on this unique publishing venture in the first place. When I bought *Billy Bunter in the Land of the Pyramids*, I hardly thought that — all these years later — you would still be publishing and have achieved so much.'






