Counting on our fingers, this represents a staggering total of 230 volumes/collections to date (E & OE). In number of individual issues it must run into many thousands!

It was our hope that this issue of the Gazette and the Greyfriars 1987 Catalogue would both be ready in time to reach you for Christmas but, in the event, this proved impossible. and any other books scheduled to be published under the Greyfriars (Miscellaneous) heading. It is comprehensive and it is definitive. It cancels all previous lists. It is thus an absolutely essential guide for every customer. Make sure you are not without your copy!

EIRE OPTS OUT

Our readers in Eire may, or may not, be aware that the Irish Republic postal authorities (Oifig An Phuist) have opted out of the UK/Irish postal connection and have decided to be part of the European postal conglomerate, thus insisting that they be treated as a 'foreign' state so far as postal arrangements between our two countries are concerned.

In consequence, the amiable system by which our Eire customers were able to take advantage of the UK contract concession of up to five books in one parcel for £1.71 postage has been brought to an abrupt end. In future, Friars in the Irish Republic have to be deemed to be 'foreign', and are required to pay the Overseas postal rate of £1.30 per book. No "bulk order" concession is allowed by the Eire authorities.

In short, purchase of Greyfriars Book Club titles is now open to all.



Book Club collectors will have noted, and regretted, the absence of two half-year periods in our straight-forward-chronological progress from the year 1908 to 1913: i.e. Magnet Issue Numbers 204 to 231 of 1912 and Numbers 256 to 281 of 1913. The fact is that these two half-yearly periods are mysteriously missing from the Fleetway (I.P.C.) files. And Fleetway, as you probably know, is our supply source for all early, rare copies of the Old Papers.

We wonder if any of our readers might, perchance, hold all of these originals? If so, we would like to borrow them — on the most generous reciprocal terms, naturally. If such there be, would the Friar get in touch with us as soon as possible?



And Friar Lionel Galloway, of 9 Woodside, Penryn, Cornwall TR10 8PH, had an interesting idea: 'If, as you say, it is uneconomic to publish the Greyfriars Press volumes, would it not be possible to accelerate the Book Club issues, even if a price increase was involved. I feel sure you would be supported in this. As far as I am concerned, and I am sure that I am far from being alone in my sentiments, it would be a catastrophe if you were unable to complete your programme which has given so much pleasure to so many of us. Anyway, all I can say is, please, please keep it going!'

Friar James Merrills, of Exshaw, Alberta, Canada, had the same idea: 'We can only hope that the continuation of the Book Club will bring about a complete set of stories after so many years. Is there any chance of increasing the number of Book Club editions during the year, as it will take a considerable time to complete the series with the present set up. I had been hoping for an early completion date, so that a new series, such as Gem, Popular, etc., etc., could be started. Hoping for better news soon.'

From 509 Windsor Avenue, Hastings, New Zealand, Friar J.R. Murtagh wrote: 'It was a sad day for me when I received your newsletter. Twice in my life I've received a sad blow. 1st in 1940 when the Magnet ceased publication and 2nd just now, to hear that the Greyfriars Press will cease publication with No. 100. This will leave approximately 300 Magnets to be reprinted and even with the Book Club carrying on will take ten years or so at the present rate — if the Book Club manages to survive. I had hoped that you and I would live long enough to see all the Magnets reprinted.'

'I was particularly grieved to note from your last Gazette that the demise of the facsimile reproduction of Magnets was imminent, and that Vol. 100 would in all probability be the last Howard Baker Press Magnet so published, apart from the Book Club volumes. I do realize that in today's world a commercial enterprise can no longer tolerate the kind of diversion of profits to subsidize a money-losing venture that Howard Baker Press must undoubtedly have subsidized out of its more profitable ventures, but I, and no doubt several other fans of Greyfriars, will be saddened by the loss. In particular, those of us of the younger generations, who became collectors late by virtue of our late births will now lose our hopes of ever completing our collections of the Greyfriars stories. I, with almost 45 Magnets and 17 Book Club editions now feel that the huge gaps that exist in my collection have no chance of being filled after the demise of the Magnet facsimile reproductions. I do hope that the auditors have a change of heart, but I do not think they will, for the joy that the Greyfriars stories instil in the hearts of millions is not a commodity that will reflect tangibly on the balance sheet of the Greyfriars Press division of Howard Baker.'



Mary Cadogan, of 24 Southend Road, Beckenham, Kent BR3 1SD, said: 'It is sad that the No. 100 volume may be the last in that format — but good news that the Club special series will continue. All of it represents a *splendid* publishing achievement. Thank you again for the many delights your books have brought to me — and to so many others.'


