Please do appreciate that a month or two must elapse before all the benefits of this New Order manifest themselves to everyone. But be assured that within a short time "the improvefullness and speedupfullness of the esteemed production line will be terrific".

At this time of writing — a month before Christmas, traditional season of bonhomie and goodwill — another fast-growing and most unwelcome recent 'tradition' threatens to make itself felt. 

'And I would like to add my own vote of thanks,' says Friar K. Pauley, of 18 Beech Avenue, Lane End, High Wycombe, Bucks HP14 3EQ, 'for all the marvellous books you've published over the years. They have given me endless hours of pleasure, and no matter how life grinds me down I find a few hours with Bunter always picks me up. My favourite Magnet period is the thirties, and though I am now reading some of your 30s volumes for the fourth time I still find them just as refreshing as first time round.

'I suppose I am a relatively young Friar, at thirty years of age. I started reading the Cassell editions when I was eight, and graduated onto your own books when I heard about them through a school library. Through the Gazette and dealer network, I have managed to collect all your books except for Volume 18, and I hope beyond hope that you continue to reprint the Magnet series until it is completed from end to end.'

It represents a lost 'status Quo', which I shall never see again in my lifetime. Frank Richards' stories appealed to boys of all classes equally. As a lad from a working class family, I admired the 'decency' of Harry Wharton & Co and deplored the shady antics of Skinner and his cronies. In fact, I believe I owe the medically 'saving grace' that I don't smoke to my distaste for the un-

derhand activities of certain groups in the Magnet.'



Friar Esmond Kadish, of 18 Grove Gardens, Hendon, London NW4 4SB, writes: 'I, too, am sad about the dropping of the Standard volume Greyfriars Press series. But no doubt this was inevitable under the circumstances. May I, however, ask you to consider the publication of a 'Special' — a Club edition of a Holiday Annual each Christmastime. I appreciate that the scheduled Book Club programme must have priority, and support this, but a Holiday Annual at Christmas now seems to be a tradition which, I feel, it would be a pity to lose.'

To which the Editor replies: 'Alas your appeal comes too late for implementation in the current '87 programme, but we will endeavour to encompass it in the next.'



From columnist Anthony Hern comes the following observation: 'It's a sort of tribute to the power of that dead language, Latin, when a teacher at a top London comprehensive school, Parliament Hill Girls' in Camden, should cause such a stir when she revealed that the funding for the study of Latin had been switched to the learning of Bengali.

'Yaroo! Bunterius exclamavit. As well he might. The Fat Owl of the Remove, along with Harry Wharton & Co, emerge from Greyfriars School speaking Latin because their creator, Frank Richards, thought it might be fun to translate one of his school stories into that dead tongue. Not just fun for him, though I'm sure it was; but fun, too, for schoolboys who might be in-

trigued to read of their heroes as part of a Latin lesson. The idea that Latin could be amusing is itself a challenge to those educationalists who are professionally anticlassics. For years they have posed the false antithesis that what is needed is not a dead language but something Living and Relevant (such as Social Studies). They are deliberately deaf to the argument that both, side by side, can be rewarding to girls and boys. Let me remind them of what the poet Horace wrote: Non omnis Moriar. For their benefit I shall translate: I shall not altogether die.'


As the postcript to the above letter shows once again, readers of The Magnet were drawn from all strata of society. It demonstrates that far from appealing to an elitist order, as some modist sociologists maintain, The Magnet had an overwhelming attraction for all social groups, and was read not only by secondary school, private school, boarding school, and grammar school pupils, but also by those attending elementary, state and charity schools.

The appeal of The Magnet transcended all barriers of class, religion and income group. To quote from The World of Frank Richards (Lofts/Adley, 1975) page 157: 'A poll conducted on the subject (of Magnet readers) showed that occupations include: doctors, chartered accountants, lawyers, airline pilots, industrial workers, postmen, miners, Members of Parliament, university professors, college lecturers, school masters and mistresses, army, navy and airforce officers and other ranks, artists priests and ministers of every denomination, civil servants, bank managers, police officers, engineers, housewives, interior decorators, photographers, company directors, authors, journalists, film actors, architects, TV personalities, librarians, publishers, stock brokers and magicians'.

The foregoing surely indicates the scope of Greyfriars fan-dom. Clearly Magnet readers were drawn from all sections of society. There was nothing whatever elitist about The Magnet or its creator, nor about the many hundreds of thousands of readers all the world over who, down the years, have drawn an immeasurable amount of enjoyment out of its pages. — Ed.


