Happily the total number of affected pages in volumes 89 to 91 is not great. Club volume 92 is another matter. It has more bad pages than the earlier volumes because although the final printed results in all of the books looks much the same the actual root cause is very different. The only thing that all of these poor pages have in common is that they were all caused by circumstances outside our control.

Nevertheless, we deeply regret every one.

As every Friar well knows, our books are facsimiles — intended to be faithful copies of the original issues we reproduce — which, in the past, have most frequently been drawn from the mint, uncirculated files of the Amalgamated Press. It follows that, in printing from such issues, there should be — and have been — very few problems.

In the case of volumes 89 to 91, the affected pages complained of were entirely due to the fact that we weren't using mint, uncirculated originals. These were missing from the old A.P. files. We appealed for help to known collectors with substantial resources but only one came to our aid. The copies he was able to provide were very far from being mint. Some pages had even been repaired — and it showed. Nevertheless, we had to use them, and we are very grateful to the late Friar Hall for his generous assistance. Without it — since on-one else was willing to help — volumes 89 to 91 might never have appeared at all.

But, as said earlier, the imperfections of volume 92 were due to other causes entirely. Still outside our control, but under the keenest scrutiny at the moment, and at present we can't say more.

But note that our very latest volume Club No. 93, THE DEFENCE OF HURREE SINGH is well up to standard — as will all future volumes.



'I SAY, YOU FELLOWS'

Publ. Wharton Press. Illustrated. £14.95.

After Mary Cadogan's biography of Frank Richards — THE CHAP BEHIND THE CHUMS — many Friars must have thought that there was nothing new left to say about the life and times of the Founder of Greyfriars School. But by dint of discovering and exploiting hitherto unavailable sources, Maurice Hall has achieved what many must have supposed to be impossible. In a most handsome production, he provides new anecdotes and new insights.

Over the years, this book will come to be regarded as a most valued addition to collectors' libraries. No doubt it will not entirely escape the cut and thrust of controversy but, after all, what biography worth its salt ever does?

THE REDISCOVERY OF 'WILLIAM'

For many of us, of course, Richmal Crompton's immortal scallywag was never lost. But, triggered off by the forthcoming centenary of the birth of his creator, publishers Macmillan have been doing their best to stir up a new surge of interest who may well prove to be one of literature's true indestructibles.

The actual centenary falls on November 15th. Meantime a William Exhibition has started at the Bethnal Green Museum of Childhood; a stage production is in the pipeline from Peter Hall; and the National Film Theatre is planning a 'William Film Week' — probably in November.

On the book front, Macmillan have produced something which they describe as a 'facsimile' of the very first William book — JUST WILLIAM. It is a paper-back whereas the first book was hardcover, and the publishers have been unable to reproduce the original jacket illustration. It has been redrawn. The text pages are reproduced from one of the original books, but the overall page size is smaller. Not what we call a facsimile at all, in fact.

Much better value is THE WILLIAM COMPANION by our own Mary Cadogan — an indispensable handbook for every enthusiast. (Mac./£14.95) Both are in the bookshops now.

MAURICE MICHAEL HALL

Requiescat in Pace

Dr. Peter McCall writes:

The death has been announced of Maurice Hall, the founder Chairman of the Friars' Club. He had been battling against ill health for most of his life. As a teenager, he spent two years in hospital — the then "cure" for a hip disease. During this time, he developed diabetes; a condition that he never allowed, (as do many sufferers), to dominate his life. After retiring early, his health deteriorated further, and, sadly, rapidly. His death occurred on 27th September 1990 in the U.S.A., just two days before his sixtieth birthday.

When the Friars' Club was formed in 1982, Maurice was unanimously elected Chairman. His enthusiasm, and knowledge of the subject made him an excellent officer to the club. His loyalty to members, the club, and his own ideals, were well suited to combat the problems original members will recall when the club was formed.

Many years ago, he wrote a biography of Frank Richards. It gave me great pleasure to help Maurice with the rewriting of this book — even though the pressures of work only allowed me to assist with the first half. Released not long before his death, "I Say, You Fellows", was privately published. Containing much new material, it is a fascinating account of Frank Richards' life. There is, perhaps, not enough literary discussion for some; but that was not his aim.

That the book was reviewed in *The Times* was, for Maurice, a real 'high'. The reviewer, most astutely, captured the point of the book, "It is not really a biography at all, but one man's record of a very old gentleman who captured his imagination long ago and whose hold on it has not relaxed. You are on hallowed ground."

After a fair assessment of the book, Byron Rogers ends thus, "As retirement finally comes, an accountant can record his tribute to a man who made him happy when he was young. You do not often come on books like this."

That he was able to publish his book, and see its success before his death is a blessing that gave Maurice much satisfaction.

After retirement from work, due, to declining health, Maurice devoted his time to the Club and Hobby which had always been so much of his life.

Once it became plain that the illness was terminal, he bravely determined to fly to the USA to see his family and grand-children. Sadly, while out there, he collapsed, and his condition rapidly worsened.

When I spoke to him only the night before he passed away, he was making plans for his return home the following day; and discussing the future of the Friars' Club.

While death is always hard to accept, it is comforting to know that the family, whom he always held most dear, had all been able to make their personal farewells. Many of us, too, were able to speak to him and, in our own ways, say our good-byes to a dear friend whom we will all miss.

Finally, we all extend our deepest condolences to Molly, his widow, his children and Denis, his brother, (also a member of the Club).
