FRANK RICHARDS

a tribute

The writing phenomenon known to the world as Frank Richards (real name Charles Hamilton) died at his home at Kingsgate in Kent on Christmas Eve 1961 at the age of eighty-six.

By then it is estimated that he had written the

equivalent of one thousand full-length novels.

His work appeared continuously for over thirty years in those famous Fleetway House magazines *The Magnet* and *The Gem.* Most famous of all was his immortal creation Billy Bunter, the Fat Owl of the Greyfriars Remove, whose exploits together with those of the other boyhood heroes Harry Wharton and Co., delighted generations of readers from 1908 to 1940.

The war unhappily saw the end of *The Magnet*, but though the post-war years brought the return of Greyfriars stories in other formats nothing ever quite recaptured the evergreen magic of the original much-loved boys' paper. It was for this reason that, two years ago, Howard Baker presented the first of his now world-renowned faithful facsimiles.

The brilliant character studies of boys and masters created by Frank Richards ensured his own immortality. Apart from the boys of Greyfriars there was the unforget-table Mr. Quelch, the Remove form-master ("a beast, but a just beast"), the Reverend Dr. Locke, the venerable Headmaster of the school, William Gosling, the school porter who firmly believed that "all boys should be drownded at birth", and Sir Hilton Popper, the irascible school governor. All these characters and many, many more are to be found within the pages of these volumes.

Each of the Howard Baker editions contains a complete series of stories from *The Magnet's* great golden age. And each is a fitting memorial to the glowing imagination, the humour and the humanity and the well-nigh incredible industry of its brilliant author.

Frank Richards loved writing for the young, and affirmed that no writer could do any better work in life than this. Certainly none did it better than Frank Richards himself.

THE DOWNFALL OF HARRY WHARTON

Acknowledged by Hamiltonian experts to be one of the outstanding series of the Golden Age of the Magnet, it records the fall from favour of Harry Wharton, the Captain of the Remove, and the elevation of Herbert Vernon-Smith – The Bounder – to that much sought-after office. It concludes with the reinstatement of Wharton to the captaincy and the end of a long and bitter feud.
