In the main the Bunter content was of picture strip format but nevertheless there is an increasing interest in this subject by younger collectors and therefore one should not ignore it. We are indebted to both Alan Clark and David Ashford for their assistance with data for the Annual publication as well as to Darrell Swift for his help with the Bunter Books and Billy Bunter Annuals.

Also included in the listing are the stage plays and those that appeared on television, for as the years roll by and memories fade many collectors will be unaware of the fact that they ever appeared. Several of these have been published and possibly one day someone may see fit to collect these scripts together and publish them as a collection.

As always we ask readers to inform us if they find any errors or have anything to add to our listing. Suggestions that may assist us in future projects are of course always welcome.

BUNTER BOOKS, THE

Charles Skilton conceived the idea for the Bunter Books after seeing the article about Frank Richards in Picture Post in 1946. Much to Mr Skilton's delight when he contacted Frank Richards the latter readily agreed to write for him suggesting the rate to be 30/- per 1000 words. Skilton advocated that he, Richards, took a royalty on the book a suggestion that proved valuable for the latter earned over £1000 instead of his expected £90.

Billy Bunter of Greyfriars School was an immense success and sold 25,000 copies almost immediately, the limit that could be produced at that time.

All the Skilton books were illustrated by R J MacDonald but after his death Cassells engaged C H Chapman to take over and this he did with number 17 Backing Up Billy Bunter.

This is a reissued set of Bunter Books edited by Kay King and reillustrated. Issued to attract the younger reader and to introduce young people to the writings of Frank Richards. Whilst these books are nicely produced and printed on somewhat better paper than the originals. The popularity will depend entirely on the intended market for they are unlikely to attract diehard readers if only due to the dust jackets and inside illustrations by Victor Ambrus. These revamped drawings have nothing in common with C H Chapman or indeed R J MacDonald who though not a traditional Greyfriars artist worked on early Bunter Books. It is interesting to note that the copyright is given as Frank Richards and Kay King 1982.

KNOCKOUT

It is not practical to list the adventures of Billy Bunter in the Knockout due to the fact that they were of a comic strip format as opposed to picture stories, however it is worth recording some details about the Bunter strip that appeared in the first nine issues of Knockout, drawn by C H Chapman, the Magnet artist. Around 1939 Chapman had drawn a few strip pages for the Magnet, and it was felt that here was the ideal type of picture strip for the new venture. Readers of Magnet were urged to read these new picture strips in Knockout, whilst readers of the latter were advised to read the full-length Bunter stories appearing in Magnet. Chapman's illustrations could not be faulted, amusing picture stories of authentic Greyfriars incidents that even the most ardent story paper fan would enjoy. Unfortunately, there was a snag. Chapman could not keep up this two-page strip on a weekly schedule with his Magnet work as well. As any artist knows, it takes much longer and

requires far more painstaking detail, to draw panels featuring human figures, than the quick slick type of cartoon drawing.

Consequently, after only nine instalments, Knockout had to find a new artist. Several were tried but without much conviction. Then the editors decided that as Billy Bunter was an extremely amusing character, there was no earthly reason why he should not appear in comic strip format. Frank Minnitt, who happened to be in the editors office just at the right moment, was then given the job of producing weekly two-page strips of the famous fat boy. After a slow beginning where he was required to emulate Chapman, he gradually brought into his work his own ideas of the character, broader and more slapstick, and the picture count was increased to twelve per page. In time, many comic readers identified Minnitt's version as the only true likeness of Frank Richards' creation. Most of the weekly episodes dealt with Bunter's greed and his misdeeds against his deadly foe, Mr Quelch, form-master of the Remove. By 1942 Minnitt had eliminated Harry Wharton and the Famous Five and introduced another foil in the small shape of Jones Minor, a bespectacled youth who looked more like a Third Former than a fellow Removite! Jones was a 'swot', an intellectual contrasting with Bunter's thick-headedness.

The Magnet itself finished suddenly due to paper shortage on 18 May 1940. Readers stranded in mid-air at the start of a new series of stories were surprised to see a caption printed in big letters across the top of the Knockout dated 1 June; "This Is the Magnet Too!" The official incorporation changing the title to Knockout and Magnet occurred in the 15 June issue. The readership of the Magnet was roughly in the 12 to 18 year old group, ranging upwards to include many adults who were readers from childhood. In its heyday, there was no doubt that Magnet was an extremely popular paper with a circulation of 250,000 at its peak. Over the years, and especially in the Thirties, it had gradually declined due to the growing popularity of the D C Thomson "Big Five". By 1940 its circulation was down to the 83,000 mark.

The stories of Frank Richards were all exceedingly well written, and were of a far higher standard than usually found in boys fiction. Most readers had long put comics behind them, and it was in a sense completely unrealistic

for the Knockout editor to expect them to revert from high-class fiction to comic strips. It is conceded that some very young Magnet readers may have enjoyed at least the Bunter strips by Chapman, but on the whole the majority of readers considered them an insult to their intelligence. As there were at least four completed stories in hand when Magnet closed, it would have been far more sensible to have printed these in shorter instalments in the Knockout. This would have gained for them a number of the old Magnet readers. As it was, many of them were outraged by the whole affair. The stories in hand were never used, and they were lost, it is claimed, when an A.P. director died. As they had been paid for, it was a complete loss to the company. Roy Nash, a film critic and ardent Magnet fan, writing in a Forces newspaper, compared the new strip cartoon Bunter to "like a pale NAAFI teacake of a character": Many others who were tempted to buy a copy of Knockout with the alluring subtitle probably gnashed their teeth with rage at reading about Jone Minor, never a Richards character, and seeing mention of Harry Wharton's sister, when the fellow was known to be an only child! There was also at times incredible dialogue: Mr Bunter calling Mr Quelch "Quelchy", and times when the form-master held out his hand for the school fees! Unheard of things in the carefully structured Frank Richards set-up.

On the other hand the editor of Knockout could easily have made the valid point that his new paper was of the modern format and he was catering for a complete new generation of young readers. There was no room for the old sentiment and besides within its first year of publication Knockout's sales were at least six times that of the Magnet and were rising all the time. In the Fifties, when paper shortage had reduced Bunter to a single page Minnitt was able to get commissions on other comics.

Minnitt was a prolific and reliable worker, always on schedule and often many weeks in advance with the strip. Other artists work was held in reserve in case he fell ill but the contributions never seemed to have been used. Cyril Price and Wally Robertson both submitted Bunter strips and Denis Gifford contributed strips and layouts for a number of Minnitt strips.

Readers may wonder what the reaction of creator Charles Hamilton was on seeing his famous fat boy in strip form.

Curiously, he never made any comment at all! But it is interesting to note that he was paid an honorarium of £5 per week each time the strip appeared, for 22 years right up to his death in 1961. Amusingly enough (but not to the artist) Hamilton was receiving more than the artist himself back in 1940, though by 1950 inflation had eroded this away. Frank Minnitt died in the summer of 1958: in 1961 Knockout was renamed Billy Bunter's Knockout...a tribute Minnitt never knew.
